THE TEXAS GOLF ASSOCIATION (TGA) is a non-profit, membership-based organization that is dedicated to promoting, advancing, and supporting all aspects of the game of golf in Texas. Founded in 1906, the TGA is an official representative of the United States Golf Association[®] (USGA) and serves as the governing body for amateur golf in the state.

The TGA is among the largest of the USGA's 57 Allied Golf Associations nationwide with nearly 600 member clubs and more than 181,000 individual members. The TGA remains committed to growing and improving the long-term health of the game in Texas by ensuring that significant resources and the most experienced personnel are in place to meet the current and future needs of its membership.

In its ongoing efforts to make golf more accessible, inclusive and engaging at every level of play, the TGA provides a wide range of services covering all aspects of the game including administering the World Handicap System[®], hosting educational seminars, conducting premier amateur championships for elite men, women, and junior players as well as fun, social outings for recreational golfers, establishing developmental programs for beginning and adaptive golfers, and access to exclusive benefits that help enhance the enjoyment of the game.

In addition, the TGA Foundation, the charitable arm of the TGA, continues its mission to positively impact the lives of deserving young people through the game of golf. With its combination of both on and off the course programs and initiatives, including providing affordable rounds of golf for \$5 or less with Youth on Course, work experience and mentorship by way of Bill Penn Internships, college scholarships and much more, the Foundation is helping the next generation of Texans from all backgrounds enjoy the many opportunities the game of golf has to offer.

The TGA provides Professional Services for both the Texas Golf Hall of Fame and the International Association of Golf Administrators.

Message from the President

Dear Fellow Golfers:

I have been involved with the Texas Golf Association since 2013, but I had not gotten the in-depth exposure to the full breadth of operations until my first year as President in 2024. While there were plenty of eye-opening moments, truly one of the most amazing experiences for me was seeing the over 150 volunteers working seamlessly together to support the more than 180 events the TGA hosted last year. What a great group of people! They were in constant motion attending to details large and small, and had a comprehensive knowledge of their duties and responsibilities, the Rules of Golf, and how to take care of any difficulties that came about.

I also spent a great deal of time with the TGA staff on site at events. There is a tremendous amount of planning that goes into conducting these events but, given the nature of the game and that it's played outdoors, there are nearly always unforeseen stresses. These grand stages produced an incredible list of champions last year, four of which earned automatic exemptions to their respective USGA national championships, and are instrumental in driving participation at all levels. We are grateful to our member clubs for their generosity, for creating lasting memories for the players, and for adding to the rich history of amateur golf in Texas.

At a management level, led by Executive Director Stacy Dennis, we are very fortunate to have a passionate group of outstanding staff members throughout the various departments who care deeply about golf, and for growing and serving the membership base. I thank them for their continued efforts which ensure the overall health and prosperity of the game.

I would be remiss in closing if I did not mention the TGA Foundation and the impact it is making in the industry through outreach and financial contributions. They have expanded our Adaptive Golf programs, tripled the number of Bill Penn Internships, and promoted diverse employment in golf.

I have been honored and humbled watching the TGA and how it delivered on all fronts in 2024. It is a privilege to work alongside such a dedicated group of people – board members, committee members, staff and volunteers – that are united in their mission to make Texas one of the best places in the world to play golf.

North Volunteer of the Year Randy Guillot



Randy's journey with the TGA began long before his volunteer work. Having spent the last decade of his career as the TGA's Managing Director of Finance, he witnessed firsthand the critical role volunteers play in the organization's success. "I've been around the game of golf since I started caddying for my father at age 10," he said. "Volunteering with the TGA felt

like the perfect way to give back to a game that has been such a significant part of my life."

For the past two years, Randy has contributed his time and expertise in tournament operations, rules officiating, and even course rating. Among his favorite responsibilities is working at tournaments and USGA[®] qualifiers, where he takes pride in doing whatever it takes to ensure events run smoothly. South Volunteer of the Year David Forkner



Forkner's volunteer journey was sparked by the influence of former colleague, Al Grazis. After years of seeing posts from Grazis about his work as a starter at TGA events, he reached out to reconnect and learn how to get involved. That conversation reignited a passion for golf and opened the door to new opportunities in retirement.

Among his many responsibilities, Forkner finds the most joy in serving as a starter, welcoming players and building relationships. "I love getting to know the players! Since most of them play multiple times a year, I enjoy building those relationships—even if I do butcher a few pronunciations," he joked.

Volunteering with the TGA has brought more than just a connection to the game—it's given Forkner a renewed sense of purpose. "As a retiree, it assists in giving me purpose each week, each event! Course Rating Volunteer of the Year Tom Liewer



Volunteering is often described as giving back, but for Tom Liewer, it's been a journey of camaraderie, learning, and meaningful contributions. "It's an honor for the Houston area rating team," Liewer shared. "This recognition is truly for the full team, led by Bill White and inspired by Carl Tongberg, who has been instrumental in my 15+ years of involvement. Their





- The golfing communities of Texas and Oklahoma converged in an exciting new event as the Texas Golf Association (TGA) and the Oklahoma Golf Association (OGA) joined forces to host the **inaugural Red River Cup Matches**, November 20-21 at The Territory Golf & Country Club in Duncan, Okla.
- Beginning in 2024, four of the TGA's and LJT's most prestigious championships were designated as official USGA Exemption Events, with the winners of the selected championships earning full exemptions into their respective USGA national championships. The Texas Amateur and Women's Texas Amateur champions will earn exemptions into the current year's U.S. Amateur and U.S. Women's Amateur, while on the LJT the winners of the Texas Junior Amateur Boys 15-18 Division and Girls 15-18 Division will earn exemptions into the following year's U.S. Junior Amateur and U.S. Girls' Junior Amateur.

Project Muni Grant Program

A two-part grant funding program focused on providing grants to member club municipal facilities to 1) cover the cost of a USGA Course Consulting Service (CCS) and 2) matching fund grants (up to \$10,000) to a facility wanting to implement CCS recommendations or to make other improvements that will support sustainability, enhance player experience, or make the game more accessible.

In 2024, Project Muni distributed a total of \$100,000 to 17 member club municipal facilities across Texas to help fund USGA CCS and recommended improvement projects.

Youth on Course is a national program allowing members 18 and under to play golf at participating clubs for \$5 or less. 2024 was the fastest year of growth in the organization's 18-year history, with the last million rounds played in less than a year.
